# **Opinion**

We have audited the financial statements of Dundee Airport Limited for the year ended 31 March 2019, which comprise the Statement of Comprehensive Income, the Balance Sheet, the Statement of Changes in Equity and the notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Section 1A 'Small Entities' of Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice applicable to Small Entities).

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

#### 1. General information

These financial statements are presented in Pounds Sterling (GBP), as that is the currency in which the company's transactions are denominated. They comprise the financial statements of the company drawn up for the year ended 31 March 2019.

The continuing activity of Dundee Airport Limited is to provide and operate a safe, secure and efficient airport which supports the communities we serve.

Dundee Airport Limited is a private company limited by shares and is incorporated in the United Kingdom and registered in Scotland. Details of the registered office and registered number can be found on the company information page of these financial statements.

## 2. Statement of compliance

The financial statements of Dundee Airport Limited has been prepared in compliance with United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Section 1A 'Small Entities' of the Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice applicable to Small Entities) (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

## 3. Accounting policies

## 3.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise specified within these accounting policies.

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with Section 1A 'Small Entities' of FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgement in applying the company accounting policies.

#### 3.2 Going concern

The company's parent receives subsidies from the Scottish Ministers on an annual basis to ensure the continuing operation of Dundee Airport Limited. The annual financial statements are prepared on the assumption that the company will continue to receive such subsidies, via the parent company, for the foreseeable future. The directors recognise the £2,260,000 (2018: £1,969,000) deficit in the profit and loss reserve. The deficit arises from bringing a long term pension liability onto the balance sheet and having deferred subsidies of £6,045,000. The pension liability is a long term liability and deferred subsidies do not represent a liability due to be paid. This deficit does not reflect the company's ability to continue as a going concern or meet its liabilities when due. The company also has net current liabilities of £385,000 (2018: £576,000). The net current liabilities position has arisen due to the company owing group undertakings £508,000 (2018: £477,000) (see Note 15) and having deferred income of £nil (2018: £177,000). The group undertakings will not seek payment until the company is in a position to pay and deferred income does not represent a liability due to be paid. Excluding these amounts the company has net current liabilities of £69,000 (2018: net current assets £78,000).

The parent company, Highlands and Islands Airports Limited, sets an annual group budget which aims to balance income, expenditure and operating subsidy provisions set by government. The group's operating subsidy provision has been set at £20.3 million for the year ending 31 March 2020. This is considered by the Directors to be adequate to sustain the group as a going concern having considered the 12 months ahead from date of approval of the financial statements.

## 3. Accounting policies (continued)

#### 3.3 Revenue

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the company and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured as the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, excluding discounts, rebates, value added tax and other sales taxes. The following criteria must also be met before revenue is recognised:

# Rendering of services

Revenue from a contract to provide services is recognised in the period in which the services are provided in accordance with the stage of completion of the contract when all of the following conditions are satisfied:

- the amount of revenue can be measured reliably;
- it is probable that the company will receive the consideration due under the contract;
- the stage of completion of the contract at the end of the reporting period can be measured reliably; and
- the costs incurred and the costs to complete the contract can be measured reliably.

#### 3.4 Subsidies

Subsidies represent amounts received from the Scottish ministers, via the parent company, in accordance with Section 34 of the Civil Aviation Act 1982 along with other revenue and capital grants.

Subsidies in respect of capital expenditure are credited to a deferred income account and are released to the Statement of Comprehensive Income over the expected useful lives of the relevant assets.

Subsidies for revenue expenditure are included within turnover in the period to which they relate.

#### 3.5 Penalona

# Defined benefit pension plan

The company operates a defined benefit plan for certain employees. A defined benefit plan defines the pension benefit that the employee will receive on retirement, usually dependent upon several factors including but not limited to age, length of service and remuneration. A defined benefit plan is a pension plan that is not a defined contribution plan.

The liability recognised in the Balance Sheet in respect of the defined benefit plan is the present value of the defined benefit obligation at the balance sheet date less the fair value of plan assets at the balance sheet date (if any) out of which the obligations are to be settled.

The defined benefit obligation is calculated using the projected unit credit method. Annually the company engages independent actuaries to calculate the obligation. The present value is determined by discounting the estimated future payments using market yields on high quality corporate bonds that are denominated in sterling and that have terms approximating to the estimated period of the future payments ('discount rate').

The fair value of plan assets is measured in accordance with the FRS 102 fair value hierarchy and in accordance with the company's policy for similarly held assets. This includes the use of appropriate valuation techniques.

Actuarial gains and losses arising from experience adjustments and changes in actuarial assumptions are charged or credited to other comprehensive income.

The cost of the defined benefit plan, recognised in profit or loss as employee costs, except where included in the cost of an asset, comprises:

- a) the increase in net pension benefit liability arising from employee service during the period; and
- b) the cost of plan introductions, benefit changes, curtailments and settlements.

The net interest cost is calculated by applying the discount rate to the net balance of the defined benefit obligation and the fair value of plan assets. This cost is recognised in profit or loss as a 'finance expense'.

#### 3.6 Taxation

Tax is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income, except that a charge attributable to an item of income and expense recognised as other comprehensive income or to an item recognised directly in equity is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

The current corporation tax charge is calculated on the basis of tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date in the countries where the company operates and generates income.

# 3.7 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets under the cost model are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

At each reporting date the company assesses whether there is any indication of impairment. If such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined which is the higher of its fair value less costs to sell and its value in use. An impairment loss is recognised where the carrying amount exceeds the recoverable amount.

The company adds to the carrying amount of an item of fixed assets the cost of replacing part of such an item when that cost is incurred, if the replacement part is expected to provide incremental future benefits to the company. The carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognised. Repairs and maintenance are charged to profit or loss during the period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method.

The estimated useful lives range as follows:

Freehold buildings - 20 - 25 years

Leasehold buildings - over the remaining life of the lease to a

Navigation aids - 5 - 20 years

Runways, aprons and main services

Land and assets in the course of construction and installation are not depreciated.

The assets' residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively if appropriate, or if there is an indication of a significant change since the last reporting date.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

#### 3.8 Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value, being the estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost is based on the cost of purchase on a first in, first outbasis.

At each balance sheet date, stocks are assessed for impairment. If stock is impaired, the carrying amount is reduced to its selling price less costs to complete and sell. The impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

#### 3.9 Financial instruments

The company only enters into basic financial instrument transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade and other debtors and creditors.

Debt instruments (other than those wholly repayable or receivable within one year), including loans and other debtors and creditors, are initially measured at present value of the future cash flows and subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Debt instruments that are payable or receivable within one year, typically trade debtors and creditors, are measured, initially and subsequently, at the undiscounted amount of the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received. However, if the arrangements of a short-term instrument constitute a financing transaction, like the payment of a trade debt deferred beyond normal business terms or financed at a rate of interest that is not a market rate or in the case of an out-right short-term loan not at market rate, the financial asset or liability is measured, initially, at the present value of the future cash flow discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument and subsequently at amortised cost.

Financial assets that are measured at cost and amortised cost are assessed at the end of each reporting period for objective evidence of impairment. If objective evidence of impairment is found, an impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

For financial assets measured at amortised cost, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. If a financial asset has a variable interest rate, the discount rate for measuring any impairment loss is the current effective interest rate determined under the contract.

#### 3.10 Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment.

## 3.11 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

# 3.12 Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other financial liabilities, including bank loans, are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

### 3.13 Share capital

Ordinary shares are classified as equity. Called up share capital represents the nominal value of shares that have been issued.

An estimate of the Employer's future cashflows is made using notional cashflows based on the estimated duration above. These estimated cashflows are then used to derive a Single Equivalent Discount Rate (SEDR). The discount rate derived is such that the net present value of notional cashflows, discounted at this single rate, equates to the net present value of the cashflows, discounted using the annualised Merrill Lynch AA rated corporate bond yield curve (where the spot curve is assumed to be flat beyond the 30 year point). This is consistent with the approach used at the previous accounting date.

Similarly to the approach used to derive the discount rate, the Retail Price Index (RPI) increase assumptions is set using a Single Equivalent Inflation Rate (SEIR) approach, using the notional cashflows described above. The single inflation rate derived is that which gives the same net present value of cashflows, discounted using the annualised Merrill Lynch AA rated corporate bond yield curve, as applying the BoE implied inflation curve. As above, the Merrill Lynch AA rated corporate bond yield spot curve is assumed to be flat beyond the 30 year point and the BoE implied inflation spot curve is assumed to be flat beyone the 40 year point. This is consistent with the approach used at the previous accounting date.

Mortality rates for 2019 are based of S2PA tables with a 130% multiplier, making allowance for future improvement factors in line with the CMI 2018 model, with a long term rate of 1.5% p.a. with a smoothing parameter of 7.0. The disclosures above is respect of mortality relate to assumptions based on longevity (in years) following retirement at the Balance Sheet date, with "future" being that relating to an employee retiring in 20 years time.

The results stated in the tables above are sensitive to the assumptions used.

# 15. Related party transactions

During the period revenue subsidies of £2,863,993 (2018: £2,482,451) was received from the Scottish Ministers via Highlands and Islands Airports Limited and £387,938 (2018: £374,216) was payable to Airport Management Services Limited, a fellow subsidiary of Highlands and Islands Airports Limited. Of this £397,792 (2018: £nii) remained outstanding at 31 March 2019 from Highlands and Islands Airports Limited and £63,460 (2018: £35,359) to Airport Management Services Limited. During the period capital subsidies of £339,283 (2018: £179,780) was received from the Scottish Ministers.

Included within expenditure is a management charge of £444,615 (2018: £421,284) from Highlands and Islands Airports Limited. £444,615 was due to Highlands and Islands Airports Limited from Dundee Airport Limited, £nil (2018: £20,225) was disclosed within trade creditors and £444,615 was disclosed within accruals (2018: £421,284).

During the year purchases of £206,841 (2018: £113,836) were made, in relation to normal operating activities, from Dundee City Council. At 31 March 2019, £5,566 was due to Dundee City Council by Dundee Airport Limited and was disclosed within trade creditors and accruals (2018: £1,500). David Martin, a director of Dundee Airport Limited, held the post of Chief Executive of Dundee City Council during the year.

The amounts outstanding at the year end are unsecured for cash settlement in accordance with usual terms.

#### 16. Parent undertaking and controlling party

The company's immediate parent undertaking is Highlands and Islands Airports Limited. It has included the company in its group financial statements, copies of which are available from the registered office, Inverness Airport, Inverness, IV2 7JB.

The company's ultimate controlling party is the Scottish Ministers who own the entire share capital of Highlands and Islands Airports Limited.
